REDUCE WATER CONSUMPTION IN YOUR GARDEN

- Plant drought-tolerant plants. Many of the lawns and plants we use are not intended for the unique Valley climate.
- Reduce turf area in your yard. Choose turf that goes dormant in winter, reducing need for winter irrigation.
- Adjust your sprinklers. Up to 80 percent of residential water use goes to maintaining our yards.
- Check your irrigation system. Do a weekly check for broken or clogged sprinkler heads and replace them right away.
- Do you see water runoff from your yard each time you water? It could mean the lawn needs aeration. When you aerate your lawn, you give the water somewhere to go besides down the storm drain.
- Use a broom instead of a hose. Sweeping up rather than hosing off leaves or grass clippings not only saves water, but putting them into a green yard waste recycling container saves landfill space as well.
- Get an adjustable hose nozzle with a shutoff feature for outdoor use. That way you can adjust the spray to meet your needs. Five minutes of an open hose running is the same as a twentyminute shower.
